

My story of being a HighSight scholar is somewhat unconventional to outsiders, but to fellow scholars, it is a relatable story. My mom first heard about HighSight while I was a freshman at Archbishop Quigley high school. Growing up in a single-parent household, my mom always looked for a way to stretch a dollar. And

what better way to do so by having an organization help pay for a good high school education. Without the aid of HighSight, my brother Daniel, my sister Christina, and I would not have been able to attend private high schools all at the same time (Daniel and I are two years apart; and Christina and I are four years apart in age). Despite growing up without a father most of my life, HighSight mentors and my high school teachers filled the void of another parent.

I remember a couple of occasions when my mentor, Matthew Charles, told me algebra would not be a difficult subject as long as I put forth some type of effort. He said. "If you could walk through Humboldt Park and the Cabrini-Green Projects without getting chased you can understand algebra." Mind you, this was before Humboldt Park became a new 'hispster' area. Thanks to Matthew, he showed me that if I use common sense I can do almost anything.

James Lackland, another memorable mentor, constantly asked me the question "Why" to every response I gave him. While reading and discussing the story of a young boy trying to find his way through life in J.D. Salinger's The

Catcher and the Rye, James always wanted in-depth answers. He instilled in me the ability to become an analytical thinker.

My favorite HighSight memory is when I won the Duhon award my senior year of high school. Mark Duhon's father had recently passed away and his family decided to create an award in honor of his father's name. The award was given to a graduating scholar who exemplified



the HighSight mission statement, "Go Another Mile." Proudly, I accepted the award. I remember talking with my mom the night of my HighSight graduation and hearing her say how proud she was of me for working hard in high school. She knew academics did not come easily to me because I was distracted and was unmotivated my first year of high school. In all honesty, without HighSight helping me complete my weekly homework, I probably would not have finished high school. Today, I am happily married and a Sales Operations Supervisor at CDW.
